Minutes of the Annual Town Meeting 2025
First Deliberative Session
Saturday February 1, 2025

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rindge in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

FIRST SESSION: You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the Annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Rindge Memorial Elementary School, 58 School Street, Rindge, NH on Saturday the 1st of February 2025 at 9:00 am. The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion and debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except the election of officers and warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by law. You are also hereby notified to meet for the School (Deliberative) Session held at the Rindge Memorial Elementary School, 58 School Street, Rindge, NH on Wednesday, the 5th of February at 6:30 pm.

SECOND SESSION: You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the Annual Town Meeting on Tuesday the 11th of March 2025, at the Rindge Memorial Elementary School, 58 School St, Rindge, NH between the hours of 7:00am and 7:00pm to vote by official ballot to elect Town Officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and to vote on those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by state law.

Moderator Kirk Stenerson opened the meeting at 9:04am. We had a moment of silence for the plane/helicopter crash victims in Washington DC. The Boy Scouts Troop and pack 308 Color Guard presented the flags and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Victoria Stenerson then sang the National Anthem. Kirk explained the process for the meeting, introduced the officials and Department Heads in attendance and then asked for discussion or questions on the procedures. There were none.

Article 2 Zoning Article

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 1 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend Article III, A by adding a new first and second sentence in **bold**, as follows:

After passage of this ordinance, no building, structure, or land shall be used except for the purposes permitted in the district as specified in this ordinance. Any use not listed shall be construed as prohibited.

(Recommended by the Planning Board 7 in favor, 0 opposed.)

Article 3 – Zoning Article

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 2 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend the Accessory Dwelling Unit Ordinance, Section 2 by adding “existing” to the first sentence as shown in **bold** below, as follows:

For the purpose of providing expanded housing opportunities and flexibility in household arrangements to accommodate family members or non-related people of a permitted, **existing** owner-occupied, single-family dwelling, while maintaining aesthetics and residential use compatible with homes in the neighborhood.

(Recommended by the Planning Board 7 in favor, 0 opposed.)

Article 4 – Zoning Article

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 3 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend Article III, N by adding the words “on the owner’s property” to the first paragraph as shown in **bold** below, and removing the words “Tents do not require permits” from the second paragraph as shown in strikethrough below, as follows:

Campers, travel trailers and motor homes may be stored unoccupied **on the owner’s property** in any district in the Town of Rindge for any period of time.

The Board of Selectmen may issue a permit for any residential property owner to accommodate him/herself or nonpaying guests on their property to reside in campers, travel trailers or motor homes for a period not exceeding 60 days in any one year. ~~Tents do not require permits.~~ In granting the permit, the Board of Selectmen shall take into consideration legitimate concerns raised by abutters. The units shall demonstrate that proper sanitary facilities are available, as determined by the Health Officer and all applicable life safety codes are met. No unit may be used for permanent dwelling at any time.

(Recommended by the Planning Board 7 in favor, 0 opposed.)

Article 5 – Zoning Article

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 4 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board to amend Article III, S by deleting the words in strikethrough and adding the words in **bold** as follows:

Short Term Rentals: The rental of all or any portion of a Single-Family Dwelling, Two-Family Dwelling, or Multi-Unit Dwelling, with the exception of ~~Bed and Breakfast Facilities,~~ **Accessory Dwelling Units**, by the property owner thereof, **to any other person or group for periods of less than 30 days is a permitted commercial use provided that: Short Term Rentals shall require Site Plan approval, issuance of a Conditional Use Permit by the Planning Board and be in compliance with all local ordinances, regulations and applicable state laws and rules. Issuance of a Conditional Use Permit shall take into consideration adequate septic, water supply, adequate on site parking, maximum occupancy of up to three (3) people per bedroom, life safety inspections and other items deemed appropriate to protect public health and safety.** ~~Acceptable rentals shall include rentals for wedding parties and receptions, bachelor parties, corporate or institutional meetings, seminars, workshops, religious retreats, and events or activities for which attendance is not expected to exceed 25 people.~~

The purpose of the Amendment is to provide a new approval process for Short Term Rentals. (Recommended by the Planning Board 5 in favor, 1 opposed.)

Article 6 – Zoning Article

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 5 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend the Phased Development Ordinance as follows: add the words “or development” after the word “subdivision” where it appears in Section 2(1) and in Section 3; add the words “or developments” after the word “subdivisions” where it appears as shown in **bold** below, and revise the second sentence of Section 3 by deleting the words “are subdivisions that” to read:

This article shall apply to all major subdivision/**development** applications filed with the Rindge Planning Board. Major subdivisions/**developments** ~~are subdivisions that~~ create four (4) or more new dwelling units.

(Recommended by the Planning Board 7 in favor, 0 opposed.)

Article 7 – Zoning Article

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 6 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend the Phased Development Ordinance to amend the Phasing table in Section 4 by deleting the numbers shown in strikethrough and adding the numbers shown in **bold** as follows:

Article 8 – Zoning Board

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 7 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend Article XX, 11 (“Definitions”) by adding the words as shown in **bold** as follows:
 Dwelling Unit: One (1) or more rooms, including cooking facilities and sanitary facilities in a structure, designed as a single unit for occupancy **with permanent provisions** for living and sleeping purposes. **This use shall not be deemed to include such transient occupancies as hotels, motels, rooming, boarding houses or short-term rentals.**

(Recommended by the Planning Board 7 in favor, 0 opposed.)

Article 9 – Zoning Board

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 8 to the Town of Rindge Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and generally described as follows:

To amend Article XX by adding two new definitions as shown in bold below as Article XX, #31 and #35, and renumber Article XX as needed, as follows:

31. Short Term Rental: Any individually or collectively owned single-family house or dwelling unit, or any unit or group of units in a condominium, cooperative, or timeshare, or owner-occupied residential home, or part thereof, that is offered for a fee for less than 30 consecutive days for transient occupancy.

35. Transient occupancy: Temporary lodging of less than 30 days.

(Recommended by the Planning Board 7 in favor, 0 opposed.)

Article 10:

To see if the Town shall vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Five Million, Six Hundred Twenty-five Thousand, Two Hundred and Seventy-eight Dollars (\$5,625,278). Should this Article be defeated, the Default Budget shall be Five Million,

Four-hundred Eighty-seven Thousand, Eight Hundred Eighty-two Dollars (\$5,487,882) which is the same as last year with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Rindge or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

(Recommended by the Selectmen 3 in favor, 0 opposed)

(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 7 in favor, 0 opposed).

Presented By: Karl Pruter, explained it is a 5% increase. The Police Department has added 2 officers and who will be full year this year. He explained how the BAC came up with this amount.

No discussion ensued.

Article 11:

To see if the Town shall vote to authorize pursuant to RSA 33:3-a, II, the expenditure of the unused portion of the Consolidated Communications Bond approved in 2020 for the furnishing, constructing, and installing facilities and equipment to make available to every residential and business address in the Town of Rindge a "Fiber to the premises" network, and to raise and appropriate Sixty Thousand, Three-hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$60,375) in unused bond proceeds, for the installation of an HVAC/Ventilation system for the Town Office building. No amount of money needs to be raised by taxation. (3/5 vote required)

(Recommended by the Selectmen 2 in favor 0 opposed)

(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 3 in favor 4 opposed).

Presented By: Tom Coneys, Housekeeping article.

Discussion: Larry Cleveland, asked if results were posted. Was informed were not, but are available at the Town Office. He questioned transparency and wishes results posted for all to see.

Phil Stenerson, wished to know who voted against and why.

Roberta Oeser, replied there was no contract for ventilation system, no know cost and she can't recommend spending unknown money.

No Discussion ensued

Daniel Whiney (BAC) motioned to restrict further consideration

Phil Motta(BAC) 2nd motion.

Motion Carried.

Article 12

To see if the Town shall vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-eight Thousand, Five-hundred Dollars (\$38,500) for funding the additional cost of the ambulance service. If Article Ten (10) (Operating Budget) passes, this article will become null and void. If Article Ten (10) fails, and this Article is approved, the appropriations will be included in the following year's Operating Budget and Default Budget. (Majority vote required)

(Recommended by the Selectmen 3 in favor, 0 opposed)

(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 7 in favor, 0 opposed).

Presented by Bob Hamilton, he stated the ambulance service cost has gone up but it would cost more to go alone for another ambulance service.

No discussion ensued

Article Placed on Ballot as written

Article 13

To see if the Town shall vote to establish an Ambulance Service Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of providing additional funds for ambulance service charges not included in the Operating Budget, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) to put in this fund, and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from said fund. (Majority vote required)

(Recommended by the Selectmen 3 in favor, 0 opposed)

(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 4 in favor, 3 opposed).

Presented by Karl Pruter, he explained it is a backup plan for the ambulance situation. Putting money aside incase Article #12 does not pass.

Dan Whitney(BAC), explained more fully the purpose of this article. Alone Peterborough is charged \$1000 per person who uses the ambulance service.

No further discussion ensued

Article place on Ballot as written

Daniel Whiney (BAC) motioned to restrict further consideration

Phil Motta(BAC) 2nd motion.

Article 14

To see if the Town shall vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred, Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$145,000) to be added to the Fire Department Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Majority vote required)

(Recommended by the Selectmen 2 in favor, 1 opposed)

(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 6 in favor, 1 opposed).

Presented by Bob Hamilton, He explained the need for a 26yr old truck which is requiring more and more fixing.

No Discussion ensued

Article 15

To see if the Town shall vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund previously established (to meet the Town's constitutional and statutory requirement that revaluations of property assessments be done as often as every fifth year) for the Revaluation to be completed in 2025. (Majority vote required)
(Recommended by the Selectmen 3 in favor, 0 opposed)
(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 7 in favor, 0 opposed).

Presented by Tom Coneys, he explained the need for reevaluation every 5 years.

David Lister – Stated it has to be done at least every 5 years. Questioning the “as often as”

Dan Whitney – DRA approved this wording and advises NOT to change to protect the town.

Lori Rautiola stated the language was advised by town counsel and hasn't been in the warrant in the past.

Moderator Kirk looked up the statute – should say “at least as often”

David Lister – made a motion to add “at least”.

Phil Motta^{2nd}

Motion carried

Now Amended to Say:

To see if the Town shall vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund previously established (to meet the Town's constitutional and statutory requirement that revaluations of property assessments be done **at least** as often as every fifth year) for the Revaluation to be completed in 2025. (Majority vote required)
(Recommended by the Selectmen 3 in favor, 0 opposed) (Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 7 in favor, 0 opposed).

Article was changed and placed on ballot as amended.

Article 16

To see if the Town shall vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty-Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) to be added to the Highway Department Equipment Fund previously established, and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from said fund. (Majority vote required)
(Recommended by the Selectmen 2 in favor, 1 opposed)
(Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 7 in favor, 0 opposed).

Presented by Karl Pruter, He stated they were looking to replace trucks as recommended

No discussion ensued

Placed on Ballot as written

Daniel Whiney (BAC) motioned to restrict further consideration

Phil Motta(BAC) 2nd motion.

Motion Carried

Article 17

To see if the Town shall vote pursuant to RSA 35:16, to change the purpose of the existing Building Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund, as a fund to be used for new construction, additions, significant renovations, and future capital improvements to municipal buildings, and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One-Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to be added to this fund and to further name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from said fund. (2/3 vote required).

(Recommended by the Selectmen 2 in favor, 1 opposed)

(Not Recommended by the Budget Advisory Committee 3 in favor, 4 opposed).

Presented by Tom Coneys, he explained the need for saving to build new town buildings as well as maintenance on existing buildings.

Phil Stenerson, questioned why BAC is opposed?

Roberta Oeser, answered we need money in the maintenance fund more, that is why she voted against this. The money needs to stay in the Maintenance Fund. We have money in the Electric Ligh Fund for new buildings.

Dan Whitney, voted yes stated 8 – 10 yrs ago they seriously considered a Public Safety Building cost it was at that time \$3.5 million.

Kirk asked if there were any further questions or comments.

Larry Cleveland; asked about the HVAC system, and asked why the selectman was opposed

Bob Hamilton stated he voted against this as money is set aside for Capital Improvements.

Phil Motta, voted no as there are 3 separate things involved in this article. Thinks too many things bundled together, but should not be asking for \$100,000 at this time as we do not have a plan and this is asking the tax payers for too many things. For future, but not now.

Roberta Oeser commented purpose of fund will be changed not added to current purpose of maintenance, so cannot be used for maintenance.

There were concerns with all the things being asked, asked if this can be split out.

Kirk answered no, cannot create new articles at this time.

Scott Douglas, moved to remove text “to change the purpose of... to municipal buildings”

Kirk, cannot eliminate the subject of the article.

Scott Douglas, withdrew motion as the language of entire article would need to be changed.

Scott Douglas, moved to amend to delete (as stated before) and add building maintenance capital reserve fund, after “to be added”.

Kirk asked for clarification

Scott Douglas withdrew motion

June Sailor O'Day, asked to modify to change the purpose to “consider changing the purpose...” made a motion to change.

Scott Douglas 2nd

Roberta does not think that is legal language. Consider to change and raise the money.

Kirk stay with the motion.

Kirk Motion on floor “to change” to “consider changing”

Ashley Saari, the motion would make to article moot, the article's purpose most until at least next year.

Kirk “to consider” does not change the subject matter.

Ashley, asked if the fund dollar amount can be changed if this motion changes then the money will not be added to the fund. The entire article will be moot until next year.

Kirk yes, you can change dollar amounts

Motion on the floor to change the first sentence

Motion not carried.

Roberta Oeser stated Board of Selectmen should have the authority, motioned to amend the article to state after RSA 36:16 change from “to change” to “to add to” and add to be “also” used for...

Kirk so we have a motion to change “to change” to “add to” and add “also”

Phil Motta 2nd

Voice Vote “aye”

Kirk asked if there was any further discussion. Reread the article as amended.

Article placed on the ballot as amended.

Article 26

Resolved that pursuant to RSA 53-E:6(1), shall the Board of Selectmen move the default energy supply from Eversource to Cheshire Community Power (CPCNH). CPCNH has consistently offered a lower electric rate than Eversource. The projected energy savings and opportunities for the community are significant. No funding is needed from the Town. Changing the default energy supplier will not disrupt service or billing, which will continue to come from Eversource. Electric customers who do not subscribe to the default energy supply will not be impacted. Any electric customer who does not wish to participate in Community Power can opt-out at any time without charge. Community Power allows Rindge to have local oversight and accountability, whereas Eversource has no option for local input. Rindge would have the option to appoint a representative and alternate to the Cheshire Community Power Governance Council. (Submitted by Petition).

Shall the Town of Rindge, in order to protect its bodies of water, implement a salt reduction plan for its roads following NH State guidelines. Under this plan, the Town would actively pursue a documented and tracked Salt Reduction Program and become an active participant in the New Hampshire Municipal Green Snow Program. This will help to preserve and protect the numerous lakes, ponds, and streams which are a vital part of Rindge's rural character and appeal. (Submitted by Petition).
